

DIRTY. ROTTEN SCOUNDRELS...that's the title of a 1988 comedy. In the movie 2 competing con artists decide to settle a bet by being the first to swindle a young heiress out of \$50,000. The loser must leave town. Wealthy native Brit Lawrence Jamieson, living on the French Riviera, earns most of his money through big cons such as pretending to be a foreign deposed Prince who needs money to finance a secret war to liberate his people. His world is invaded by another con man, brash American Freddy Benson, whose cons work only on tens or if he is lucky hundreds of dollars. Doesn't sound very scriptural, does it? Well, there's a man in Genesis who fits the bill quite well. Not only is he a dirty, rotten scoundrel, his mother is complicit in his cons. I speak of Jacob. His story is quite familiar. By his underhanded methods he cheats his older brother out of his inheritance. And then with his mother's help, he lies to his father, treats him dishonorably, misuses God's name, and steals what is not his. This is all very interesting, if not angering. We find ourselves shaking our heads, fully expecting him to receive his just due. And Jacob does suffer extreme consequences. He is forced to flee for his life. He spends the next 20 years under the oppressive hand of his uncle. And as far as we can tell, he never sees his mother again. Isolated and estranged from his family, he encounters God. We would expect God to dress him down properly, to declare judgement on him for his unscrupulous behavior. Instead He spoke only words of comfort, reassurance, protection, and blessing. God revealed his core character: He is the God who restores. He tells Jacob, "I am with you, I will keep you, I will not leave you" Why would God pour out His favor on a scoundrel, a con artist? The answer is found in God's grace. We may not be con artists, but we can identify with Jacob. We all need God's grace! In the days leading up to Easter, we are reminded of Jesus' words, "God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him." (John 3:17) Thank you God, for Your Amazing Grace!

A friend of mine texted me recently to inform me of his brother's failing health. His brother has been placed in hospice care with his kidneys shutting down and needing his leg amputated. His days on this earth are short and the family knows it. This man has lived a pretty rough life. His brother is concerned about his salvation and had spoken with him about it. The brother in hospice care claims everything is okay, but the concerned brother wanted me to pray for him. Through the assistance of the concerned brother, I called the brother in hospice. We had a conversation about his soul. He gave the "right" answers, but I am still praying for him. I am not judging him (rendering final judgement), but I do know he has lived a spiritually fruitless life.

I have been thinking about this guy. Is there hope for him? Can he find grace (if he doesn't know Christ) from his deathbed? A look at the cross provides the answers to these questions. Jesus was crucified between two thieves. One berated Jesus from the cross, while the other placed his trust in Him. Jesus' response to the repentant thief is music to our ears: "today you will be with me in paradise." Hope was found. Forgiveness was poured out. Mercy was extended. No, he didn't deserve it, but Jesus gave it, even as he drew his last breaths.

When you stop and think about it, none of us deserve his grace. That's why it is called grace. None of us merit his mercy, his forgiveness, his salvation. Whether we are breathing our last or in the prime of our lives, we don't deserve what Jesus did for us on that cross, but friend we sure needed it. The message of the cross is good news for all of us- the healthy or the dying, the wealthy or the poor, the popular or the outcast. Just typing those words makes me want to sing the words of the hymn writer: "Hallelujah, Oh What a Savior."

I am looking forward to celebrating Resurrection Sunday with you. Come prepared to worship the Risen King.
